2 CORINTHIANS 6:14-16A EXHORTATION TO HOLINESS

"Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness? {15} And what accord has Christ with Belial? Or what part has a believer with an unbeliever? {16} And what agreement has the temple of God with idols? For you are the temple of the living God."

2 CORINTHIANS 6:16B-7:1 EXHORTATION TO HOLINESS

"As God has said: 'I will dwell in them and walk among them. I will be their God, and they shall be My people.' {17} Therefore 'Come out from among them and be separate, says the Lord. Do not touch what is unclean, and I will receive you.' {18} 'I will be a Father to you, and you shall be My sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty.' {7:1} Therefore, having these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God."

2 CORINTHIANS 7:2-3 A FINAL PLEA FOR THE CORINTHIANS TO OPEN THEIR HEARTS

"Open your hearts to us. We have wronged no one, we have corrupted no one, we have cheated no one. {3} I do not say this to condemn; for I have said before that you are in our hearts, to die together and to live together."

TAKE AWAYS

- In the past, the Corinthians participated in idolatry and other immorality (1 Corinthians 6, 8, 10). They must separate themselves from those practices and not be in relationships where the unbeliever or immoral one forms the standard or dilutes the standard of the Christian.
 - Remember 1 Corinthians 15:33
 - Come out from among them!
 - Speak up and speak out about what the unbeliever is still involved in
- We must live holy lives that we may be sons and daughters of the Lord Almighty, and He our Father.
 - Be morally pure, both internally and externally
 - Motive: the fear of God

2 CORINTHIANS 7:4-7 COMFORTED BY THE COMING OF TITUS

"Great is my boldness of speech toward you, great is my boasting on your behalf. I am filled with comfort. I am exceedingly joyful in all our tribulation. {5} For indeed, when we came to Macedonia, our bodies had no rest, but we were troubled on every side. Outside were conflicts, inside were fears. {6} Nevertheless God, who comforts the downcast, comforted us by the coming of Titus, {7} and not only by his coming, but also by the consolation with which he was comforted in you, when he told us of your earnest desire, your mourning, your zeal for me, so that I rejoiced even more."

2 CORINTHIANS 7:8-9 CAN REJOICE OVER THE WRITING OF THE FIRST LETTER

"For even if I made you sorry with my letter, I do not regret it; though I did regret it. For I perceive that the same epistle made you sorry, though only for a while. {9} Now I rejoice, not that you were made sorry, but that your sorrow led to repentance. For you were made sorry in a godly manner, that you might suffer loss from us in nothing."

2 CORINTHIANS 7:10-12 THE FRUITS OF REPENTANCE

"For godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation, not to be regretted; but the sorrow of the world produces death. {11} For observe this very thing, that you sorrowed in a godly manner: What <u>diligence</u> it produced in you, what <u>clearing of yourselves</u>, what <u>indignation</u>, what <u>fear</u>, what <u>vehement desire</u>, what <u>zeal</u>, what <u>vindication</u>! In all things you proved yourselves to be clear in this matter. {12} Therefore, although I wrote to you, I did not do it for the sake of him who had done the wrong, nor for the sake of him who suffered wrong, but that our care for you in the sight of God might appear to you."
